Dr. Rend Al-Khalili is an Assistant Professor of Radiology at MedStar Georgetown University Hospital, subspecialized in Breast Imaging. She completed her diagnostic radiology residency training at Rutgers University Hospital and her breast imaging training at Columbia University Medical Center. She joined Washington Radiology, a private practice group in Washington DC for two years prior to transitioning into academics. Besides training residents and fellows, she is very passionate about providing educational opportunities for medical students and has won multiple teaching awards in her career. At the medical school, she currently serves as the course director for breast imaging clerkship and a pre-clinical advisor and personal identity formation coach for first and second year medical students. She previously served as the women's imaging fellowship co-director at Georgetown. She is a reviewer for many radiology journals including the Breast Journal, American Journal of Roentgenology (AJR) and Journal of Breast Imaging (JBI) where she also served on the Editorial Board. Dr. Al-Khalili currently serves as the Co-Chair of the Early Career Section in addition to serving on many other committees at the Society of Breast Imaging.

Dr. David Boyd is a partner and neuroradiologist in private practice at Reston Radiology Consultants. He completed a combined MD and MBA program at Georgetown. He was awarded membership into the Alpha Omega Alpha medical honor society and the Beta Gamma Sigma business honor society. He completed his Radiology Residency and Neuroradiology Fellowship at Georgetown, where he was named Chief Resident and Resident of the Year. He has achieved a Certificate of Added Qualification in Neuroradiology as well as Fellowship in the American College of Radiology. Dr. Boyd has served as the President and CME Coordinator of the Washington, DC Chapter of the ACR, Chair of the ACR Committee on Chapters, Member of the ACR College Nominating Committee, as well as the President of the Georgetown Clinical Society. He currently serves on the ACR Council Steering Committee and as Councilor for the DC Chapter of the ACR. He recently was awarded the Gold Medal by the DC Chapter. He has lectured for the RLI since the inception of this Kickstarter course in 2018.

Dr. Ellen M. Chung is Radiologist-in-Chief at Nationwide Children's Hospital in Columbus, Ohio. A native of Washington, DC she graduated from Georgetown University and Georgetown University School of Medicine. She completed radiology residency at Tripler Army Medical Center in Honolulu, Hawaii followed by a fellowship in Pediatric Radiology at the Children's Hospital Boston. She served as President of the faculty Senate at USU and gained experience in diversity and inclusion work. She also served as the Pediatric Section Chief at the American Institute for Radiologic Pathology/Armed Forces Institute of Pathology from 2005 to 2019 and continues to teach in the radiologic pathology course attended by almost all radiology residents in the US and Canada as well as trainees and practicing radiologists in 28 different countries. She has lectured at national professional society meetings and on pediatric radiology-pathology correlation in France, Austria, Portugal, Spain, Germany, the Netherlands, Canada, Brazil, Myanmar, and Thailand.

Dr. Ann K. Jay is a neuroradiologist, specializing in Head and Neck and Skull Base imaging, at MedStar Georgetown University Hospital. In addition, she is a Clinical Professor with dual appointments in the Departments of Radiology and Otolaryngology.

At MedStar Georgetown University Hospital, Dr. Jay serves as the Vice Chair of Education, Director of Head and Neck Imaging and Division Chief of Neuroradiology. She is also an active member of the Medical Executive Committee.

For Georgetown University School of Medicine, she serves as a co-director for the Diagnostic Reasoning and Testing (DRT) medical school course and directs the 2-week Deep Dive Imaging Essentials course.

Dr. Jay serves on multiple committees for the GUSOM, including as a Faculty Senate member, Committee on Students and as a member of the DEI subcommittee of the Faculty Development Committee.

Dr. Jay is passionate about Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) and medical education. She was selected as a Lead Coach for the Bias Reduction and Improvement Coaching (BRIC) inaugural class at GUSOM and is a member of the Racial Justice for Committee for Change (RJCC). Dr. Jay is a Vice Chair of the DEI committee of the Association of University Radiologists (AUR), chair of the inaugural DEI committee of the American Society of Head and Neck Radiologists and contributed to the creation of the IDEA Scholars (Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, and Allyship) program.

Dr. Jay's clinical and research interests are in the radiographic manifestations of otolaryngology diseases, specifically, temporal bone and paranasal sinus diseases, and head and neck cancer. She specializes in the head and neck biopsies, and is one of the few radiologists in the Washington, DC area that performs percutaneous biopsies of lesions in deep neck spaces. As Director of Head and Neck Imaging, Dr. Jay is an integral part of the multi-disciplinary Head and Neck Cancer and Skull Base Disease Teams at MedStar Georgetown.

Dr. Amy Kotsenas is a professor in the Department of Radiology at Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN. She is board certified in both neuroradiology and clinical informatics.

Dr. Kotsenas was the 2016 recipient of the ACR, ASNR, AAWR Women in Neuroradiology Leadership Award and attended her first Radiology Leadership Institute meeting that fall. In May 2019, Dr. Kotsenas was elected to the American College of Radiology Board of Chancellors and now serves as Chair of the Commission for Membership and Communication.
